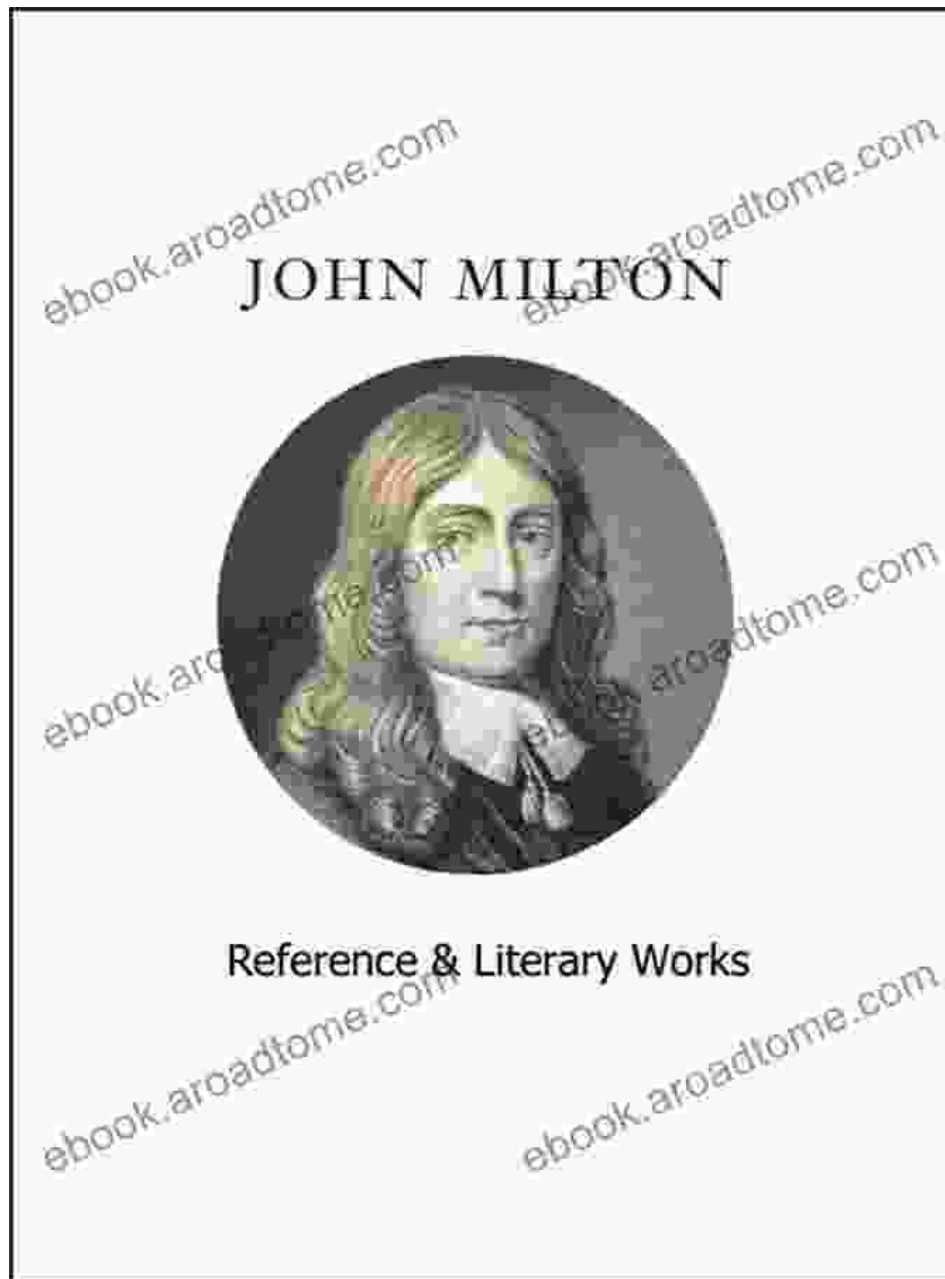
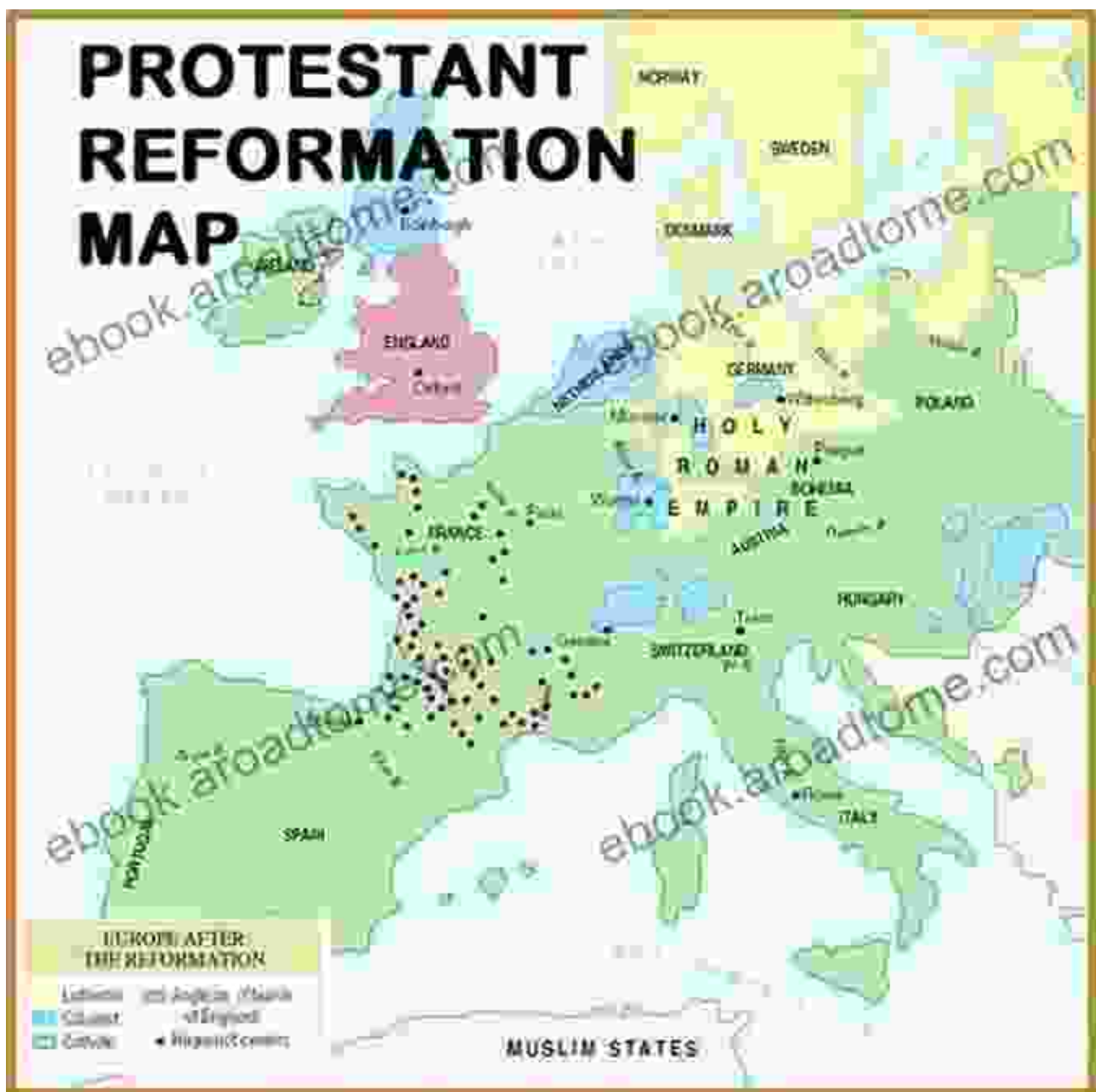


Figure 2: Textual Explorations in English Literature

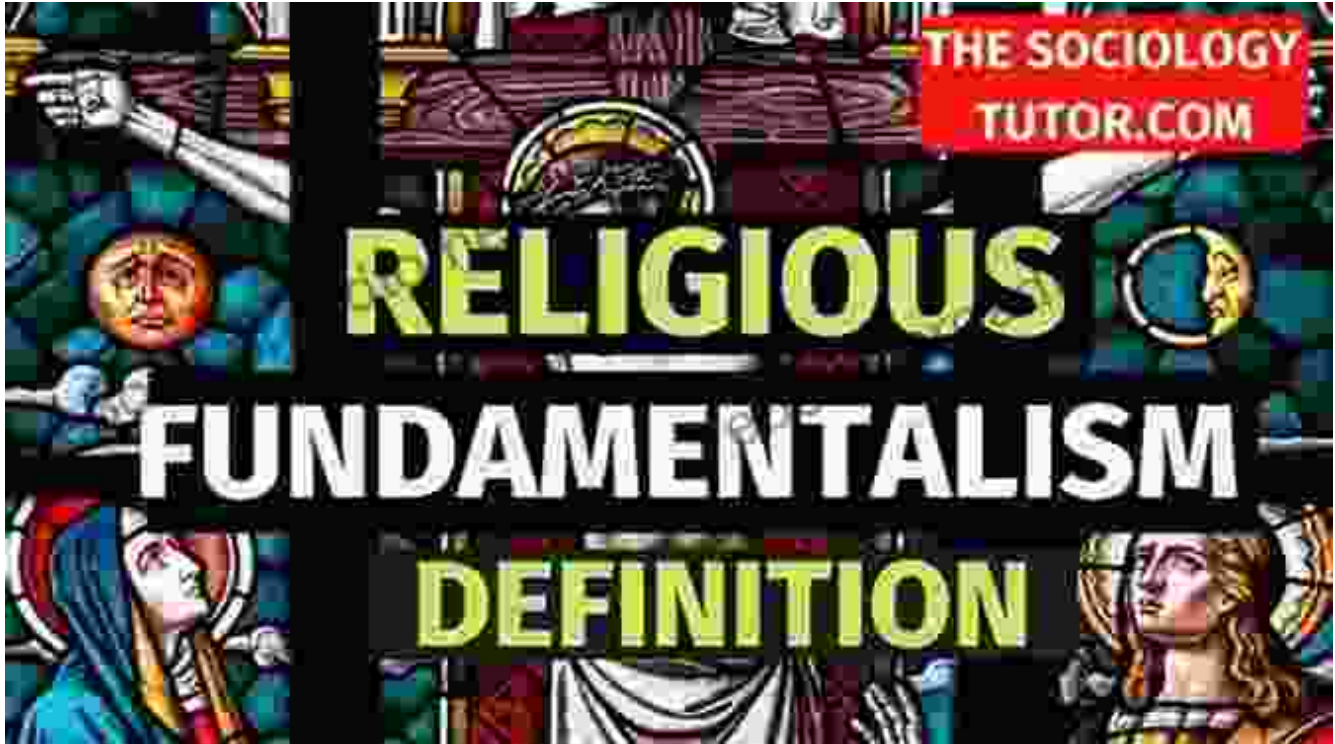


Figure 4: Religion and the State in Early Modern France
